Prevalence of Sexual Misconduct

- 11.6% of students reported at least one incident of nonconsensual sexual contact, including attempted penetration using physical force, since enrolling at Northwestern. Rates for undergraduate women (30.8%) and trans, genderqueer, nonbinary, and questioning ("TGQN") students (30.7%) were significantly higher than rates for undergraduate men (11%). This appears to have decreased from 2015, when 16% of survey respondents reported experiencing sexual contact without consent and 4% reported experiencing sexual penetration without consent
- 35% of students reported experiencing at least one type of sexually harassing behavior since enrolling in school, with 15.3% of students experiencing behavior that met the definition of sexual harassment. This is consistent with the 2015 rate of 15%
- **6.8%** of students reported experiencing at least one type of intimate partner violence. This is an increase from the 2015 rate of **4%**
- **3.7%** of students experienced stalking. This is a decrease from the 2015 rate of **8%**

Certain groups reported experiencing higher rates of sexual misconduct than other groups:

- Undergraduate women and TGQN students
- Lesbian, gay, bisexual, queer, and asexual (LGBQA) students
- Students with disabilities

Perceptions and Knowledge

- **74.3%** of students perceived that it is very or extremely likely that campus officials would take a report of sexual misconduct at Northwestern seriously
- **58.5%** of students believed it is very or extremely likely that campus officials would conduct a fair investigation in response to a report of sexual misconduct
- Students reported being very or extremely knowledgeable about
 - how sexual assault and sexual misconduct are defined at Northwestern (49.9%)
 - where to get help (45.6%), and
 - where to make a report of sexual misconduct (39.2%)
- Students' awareness of resources was lower than hoped for
 - 50% of students indicated they are aware of the Office of Equity
 - 50.8% indicated they were aware of CARE
